Message from our Headteacher

Welcome back to the second half of our Spring Term. We are all looking forward to brighter weather and more outdoor education.

The pandemic meant that school attendance percentages were much lower than usual. On their return to school, children caught infections such as chickenpox that they hadn't previously caught because of less mixing with other children. There is an expectation now that attendance levels in schools match the pre-pandemic level of 96.5% (in primary school – this is a different percentage in secondary and special education). Classes will receive a weekly reward when their class achieves either a weekly target of 96.5% or an overall target of 96.5%. These targets, when mixed together, allow for a normal level of illness within any class.

Children who have poor attendance at primary school are likely to underachieve at secondary school. Children who miss between 10% and 20% of school stand only a 35% chance of achieving five or more good GCSEs, compared to 73% of those who miss fewer than 5% of school days. Friendships are also affected by persistent absence as it is hard for a child who misses lots of school to form consistent relationships with their peers.

You are now able to view your child's attendance percentage on Weduc. Please remember that this should be 96.5% with no unauthorised late attendance. Open the Weduc APP. Click on your initial in the top right-hand corner. Select relatives, then select your child and finally select attendance


